It is the responsibility of the Trustees to determine cancellation of church services due to bad weather. They will do so at approximately 7:30AM on Sunday morning. They will either call for our morning activities to be cancelled and our worship service to begin at its usual time of 10:30AM, or in extreme weather situations, cancel church entirely. In either case, a snow cancellation notice will be left on the church phone at 508-234-8220 until Channel 7 News activates our TV cancellation notices. If the weather on Saturday is bad, our Sunday School Coordinators may make a determination to cancel Sunday School in which case they will contact all Sunday School families by phone or email.

I suspect many will agree that so far, 2022 is not off to a very good start — and as I write this column, it is only the second full week of January! Once again, Covid is de-railing plans and wreaking havoc on the health of many. And this year there are many more members of our church family who are impacted by it, people who have been "vaxed and boosted." It is a reminder that much of life is outside our control. And that makes us anxious.

Perhaps that is why we put such a concerted effort into controlling all that we think we can control. The more we can control, the safer we feel. That is especially true of people and situations that are part of our daily lives. We never fear what we know we can control. We are never anxious about what we know we can predict with certainty.

Having that sort of control means that we are relieved of the need to make decisions — which could come with either positive or negative consequences. It also means we do not need to make adjustments in the plans we make for the day, week, or year or in the way we perceive and interact with people. We've got it all figured out. We have a set of responses for the situations we know we will encounter and a map in our head of all the pathways we use to get to places in our lives.

An example of how this works is experienced every time a place to which we have been accustomed to going, say a dentist's office, moves to another location. Ever forget and go to the place where it used to be on the day of your 6-month appointment? Or at holiday time, have you ever discovered that an ingredient that you need for your favorite cookie or cake recipe, probably one of your Grandmother's, is no longer available?

Even worse is what happens when a boss you've had ever since you first started working for a company retires and you experience working under a new boss that expects you to do things in a much different way than you've "always done it before." I suspect we've all heard, if we haven't actually said, "But I've always done it that way!" New behavior patterns, whether they be navigating to a different location for the dentist's office or performing work tasks in a totally different way, can cause great anxiety in people. Hence their need for tight control!

One of the most difficult situations therapists sometimes encounter as they work with the family of a disturbed child or adolescent occurs when the family prefers the dysfunctional way something has always worked to a more functional way that requires everyone – the entire functioning system – to change even slightly. At one time or another any therapist who works with families has had the experience of trying to help a disturbed child or adolescent gain increased health when, often unconsciously, the family feels it works better with that child/adolescent functioning in an unhealthy way.

So why am I writing this column about psychotherapy as a pastor? Simple: a church is a family of faith. Control is a very big issue in churches. Who controls whom so that life is comfortable for the one who does the best job of controlling people is part of church life as much as it is part of family life. But here's the thing: The one who needs full control in order to feel safe with low anxiety levels, is often the one who lives the least satisfying and least healthy life. Learning how to ease up on the reins used to control others and how to float with circumstances instead of fighting to gain control of them, can be a big step toward a happier and healthier life for everyone.

NEW BIBLE STUDY



\$75 to purchase additional zoom account to be covered until the end of year.


Review and approve the new expense vouchers.
