On March 2 we will observe Ash Wednesday, the beginning of Lent. Lent is intended to be a time of self-reflection and self-examination. As such, it is the most difficult time during the liturgical year into which Christians enter. Perhaps that is why there is often a flurry of interest on the part of many to decide what one will give up for Lent. Chocolate? Sugar? Meat?

Giving up something for Lent is a symbolic way of fasting. Real fasting would mean going without food, social media, or a variety of entertainment experiences for the purpose

of spending time alone with God to focus on one's need for remorse and penitence for myriad attitudes, deeds, words, intents, desires, etc. that offend God. Doing that takes a lot of faith, courage, prayer, and trust in God.

The church talks a lot about the fact that God has reconciled us to God and to each other through Christ's sacrifice. But Christ's sacrifice is not the equivalent of a "get out of jail free" card! There is such a thing as "cheap forgiveness," to paraphrase Dietrich Bonhoeffer's idea of "cheap grace." Cheap forgiveness is what we expect when we say that someone we've wronged should just forgive us because that's what Christians are supposed to do. Those who are forgiven don't need to do anything except receive forgiveness.

But the reality is that the one doing the forgiving has been hurt by the one being forgiven!! Christ endured extreme spiritual, physical, and mental anguish because of humankind's self-centered willfulness to break whatever laws of God we didn't like. And we are all part of the human race to which that inclination applies. So, do we really expect Jesus to take all that pain from us and not expect anything from us in return for God's forgiveness?

What I'm getting at is that the reconciliation between God and human beings that Jesus effected is a two-part process: remorse/repentance and forgiveness. And the former precedes the latter. How dare we do a "grab and run" action, grabbing God's forgiveness as we dash away to attend whatever task or job we think is more important? By the same token, how dare we do that to another human being?

The "Truth and Reconciliation Commission (TRC) of South Africa" understood exactly what was needed for reconciliation after the end of apartheid. It wasn't easy, but it was the only way to begin a new democratic nation in peace. The work that commission did is fascinating reading. The plan was created by Christian men. Some people had been greatly hurt by people who had exercised authority over them. Opportunities were held in venues around the country for those who had been badly hurt to confront those who had hurt them so that when they were forgiven, they knew that of which they were being forgiven.

But there was an additional step taken: Those who had been hurt and those who had inflicted the pain were required by the TRC to agree upon reparation that would be meaningful to both parties. Forgiveness is not just a matter of saying, "I'm sorry." Nor is it a matter of saying, "I promise I won't do that again." That's cheap!! Forgiveness is a matter of coming to a full realization of what one has done that caused hurt (whether to God, another human, or both), then in humble contrition asking forgiveness, and finally in sincerity and humility asking how one can make meaningful reparation. History has revealed that the TRC in South Africa was a great success.

That's what Lent is all about. It is not for the faint of heart nor for those for whom faith is not a serious matter. There is not one human being on the planet who has not done something wrong, something that harmed someone else is some way. Thinking one has not is an example of one of the greatest human sins: Pride.

As Christians at UPCoW engage Lent this year, attention will be focused on self-examination, self-reflection, penitence and remorse, forgiveness, and the process of reconciliation. Forgiveness is part of the process, but it is not the first part. Traversing the whole process of reconciliation, like the TRC showed the world, is the only path forward toward peace.

Approved Global missions pledge payment.


Approved the Easter festival for April 16.
