During Lent the focus of our faith has been on the path toward reconciliation. We said the path has many stepping stones: remorse, repentance, forgiveness, reconciliation, and ultimately new life. None of those steps can be bypassed. Each step of the process must be completed in order for the ultimate goal to be reached.

Engaging the reconciliation process is a very important part of discipleship. It is so important, that Jesus himself did not bypass it. Jesus engaged it at a far

greater depth – and cost – than God ever requires human beings to do. But God does require us to walk through that process. Otherwise, our Christian discipleship – our following Jesus – is not complete. Down through history, beginning with the Apostles, those who follow Jesus have had to participate in all elements of discipleship, including remorse, repentance, and forgiveness.

There is often a tendency to view reconciliation, the culminating step in the process, to be rather simple, perhaps even an automatic, result of the steps leading up to it. Experience suggests otherwise. The only thing that is "automatic" after remorse, repentance, and forgiveness is a peace treaty. The rest of reconciliation involves work. But it is work with someone who previously opposed a plan, project, idea, or way of living in this world. It is not work done just in private devotion or with those with whom one previously agreed.

History has many examples of the work involved in reconciliation. Once that step along the path is reached, we remain on that step for a long time. Think about what happened after the Peace Treaty of Versailles was signed in 1919. Or consider what happened after the Paris Peace Conference in 1947. The fighting ended, but that did not mean that suddenly the Germans and the British sat down for afternoon tea and engaged in friendly chit-chat, sharing photos of kids and grandkids.

So it is in Christendom. The fighting stops, as it did, finally, after the bloody conflicts between Catholics and Protestants following the 16th century Reformation. Well, after the bloody fighting stopped in most places. But then the work begins in earnest. How do we find ways to live together not just in an "armed truce" but as fellow citizens in the kingdom of God? God calls all of God's children to live as loving brothers and sisters in God's kingdom.

Remorse, repentance, and forgiveness are the beginning of learning how to live as God's loved and loving children. The next part involves acceptance of a stark reality: No one can or even needs to control everything so that the world makes him or her comfortable. Instead, what makes the world a truly comfortable place is that everyone prays together asking God for a glimpse of God's New Creation, and everyone works together, contributing his and her God-given gifts to help bring that New Creation into reality. Once respect for the value of each and every person – always equal in God's sight – is realized in each and every person, the rest of reconciliation is easy, and God's New Creation is not far off.

The bottom line question for members of the United Presbyterian Church of Whitinsville is where we find ourselves on the path toward reconciliation and new creation. In Christian discipleship, how do we take the next step in the process toward reaching not only the point of reconciliation but more importantly the shared work of bringing new creation into reality? As you read this column, the church is already engaged in the process. Are you part of it?

Sometimes movement toward New Creation is a little like the old wagon train journeys. People headed west for the purpose of establishing a new life. Much had been left behind. Much had been loaded onto the wagons to help begin that new life. But no one set out alone. The wagons traveled together, each one helping to insure that they all made it. If you have not yet joined "the UPCoW wagon train" there's still time, and new wagons are always welcome. There are many ways and places to join.

SESSION NOTES


Session met for Congregational prayer meeting on March 7 and for a Stated Business meeting on March 22.

Would you please ask God to give us wisdom to know what indicators to track to help us maximize our ministry impact?
