May is a busy month at UPCoW! It is the month that the Nominating Committee meets to nominate church members to serve in a variety of roles, and it is the month in which the Stewardship Campaign kicks into gear. In other words, it is the time of year when we think about what it means to be a member of a church family. And I suppose that just begs the question of what it means to be a church.

There are many references in the New Testament that tell about Christ's relationship with the church. May worship services will explore some of those passages. The image used most often is that the church is Christ's body. Ephesians 4:11-16 says Christ's

passages. The image used most often is that the church is Christ's body. Ephesians 4:11-10 sa followers together make up Christ's body.

"It was [Christ] who gave some to be apostles, some to be prophets, some to be evangelists, and some to be pastors and teachers, to prepare God's people for works of service, so that the body of Christ may be built up until we all reach unity in the faith and in the knowledge of the Son of God and become mature, attaining to the whole measure of the fullness of Christ." (Ephesians 4:11-16).

That means that all Christians everywhere, together, make up Christ's body on earth *and* that each member is endowed by Christ with specific gifts needed for his body to fulfill its mission on earth. Individual members of each church on earth are part of Christ's body, the earthly, physical representation of the risen and ascended Christ.

That does *not* mean that the church is to be worshiped! All worship goes to God the Trinity alone. What it *does* mean is that the church does Christ's work on earth *because* the spirit within the church is Christ's Spirit. Christ's Spirit works through the individual members, in whom the Spirit resides. Where physical hands, feet, eyes, ears, and mouth are need for Christ's work to be done, Christ uses *us*. Members of the church *actively* do what Christ calls them to do.

That requires a couple of things. First of all, the church can act only as the Holy Spirit enables and empowers it to act. Members need the Holy Spirit living within them. The church can function only as its members are filled with the Holy Spirit. It isn't the building that is filled with the Holy Spirit; it is each and every member that needs to be filled!

The other need is for the church to have each of the "body parts" needed for its mission. The above passage from Ephesians says that Christ gave gifts to people. The gifts provide the "body parts" needed for the church's mission. Each member of each individual church is given a gift needed by the church in order for it to do the work God has called it to do. But in order for the church to fulfill its purpose, all those parts need to function in unison; no one or two parts can accomplish the work alone. There are no unnecessary parts in Christ's body! And there is no part that is more important than any other. A broken little finger compromises the work capability of the whole hand.

Broaden that image just a bit, and it includes the idea that individual churches are given gifts for specific missions, no church being responsible for the total mission of Christ on earth. Churches themselves are joined to make the worldwide body of Christ. Each church, filled with the Holy Spirit, has an important role to play in God's great plan. And because each church has a role in that plan, no church filled with the Holy Spirit is superfluous to that plan.

So what does that mean for UPCoW? First and foremost, UPCoW is part of God's great plan. There is very great joy in that fact! God has given UPCoW a particular role to play in that great plan, a role that

requires each part of the body represented by *this* church to function fully, empowered by the Holy Spirit. Secondly, God has gifted this church with people to whom God has given specific gifts that this part of Christ's overall body needs to fulfill the work God has give UPCoW to do. There are no unnecessary gifts or parts of this body! Thirdly, God continues to make this church grow by bringing into it additional members with gifts God has given *them* with the intention that they will contribute those gifts to the work God calls UPCoW to do.

There are all sorts of things that can distract folks from contributing the gifts God has given them to contribute, and there are all sorts of things that can distract the church's attention from God's call. Like every one of God's churches, UPCoW must remain vigilant and discerning of where it puts its focus of attention. As a general rule, all churches must be especially vigilant against the possible reversal of roles, in which the church's role becomes that of serving the needs of its members. That role reversal never works toward fulfilling God's call to the church.

Bottom line: what is the gift God has given you to contribute to the work God has called this church to do with your help? What, if anything, gets in the way of your making your contribution?

#### New Business:

- Unanimously voted to create Easter baskets to Shut-ins along with flowers.
- Decided to deliver the Easter baskets and lilies after the Easter Service.
- Learned about a Reconciliation Plan devoted to a new phase in the growth of our church. As Deacons, we have learned a little bit more about this plan, and how we can be effective stewards within the church by following a set of important points that have been shared with us.

(i.e. speaker, musical genre (instrumental/vocal) et.al talents


The Deacons meeting came to an end by sharing prayer concerns for our church members and visitors. We also shared many joys amongst ourselves, family, and friends.
