

I don't know about the rest of you, but over the course of the last twenty years I have found it increasingly difficult to observe The Holidays, Advent, and Christmas all in the course of four weeks. As we look at this four-week period in 2020, a year that has not followed any of the "rules" that make life at least quasipredictable and largely manageable, I am more unsure than ever about how to make it through November 26 - December 24 with sanity intact.

The Holidays seem to be characterized by festivities that can only be enjoyed in the company of a lot of people. Scratch that for this year! This Zoom fatigued pastor does not find the thought of Zoom Holiday Parties very appealing. It is fun to get dressed up in holiday garb and join others so attired to eat party food, drink special holiday beverages, and sing holiday

songs at parties. Doing so by Zoom is a non-starter. So much for The Holidays.

Advent and Christmas have been a mysterious combination for me ever since Advent first became the thing we celebrate in church during December. Maybe it's a generational thing, but I grew up celebrating the birth of Jesus during December, not sitting around waiting for a birth that everyone knows already happened over 2,000 years ago. As a pastor, I still believe it is important during December to focus once again on the meaning of God's coming to Earth in the form of a human being and what that means not only for faith but also for how we understand our world today in light of that birth. One prophesied Advent – Jesus' birth – has already happened, and as we wait for the second Advent – Jesus' return – our anticipation takes on more of a certainty that it will happen; after all, the first Advent happened.

Thankfully, Advent does not require large gatherings of people. One of the hallmark activities of Advent is the lighting of candles in an Advent Wreath, and that can be done individually or as a family as part of a daily (or weekly) meditation. We can meditate on our own on "The Promise Kept" and what it means for our faith. We can set aside time each day, or at least once a week, to read in the Bible the prophecies about Jesus and to go to God in prayer with thankfulness and humility.

Christmas. The word itself puts a smile on our faces and a sense of joy and gladness in our hearts. Even in the face of loss, grief, and serious illness, *Christmas* invades us with a warmth that defies description. At its heart, Christmas is about the heart. The heart of God touches the hearts of human beings with a drop of love that fills our entire being. That has been happening for centuries, regardless of immediate circumstances. Even wars have ceased for a few hours on Christmas Eve. They didn't cease so people could open expensive gifts; they ceased to remember that God came to bring Peace on Earth and good will to all people.

Christmas does not need folderol. Christmas does not need dressy clothes or fancy food. It does not need champagne or sangria or "spiked" punch. It needs a heart open to the miracle of God coming near to us in love. It needs a heart open to the miracle of our drawing near to God in love. It needs a heart that can see the divine light of God beyond the lights on a tree or the lights that outline buildings.

Advent and Christmas cannot be stopped by a disease, not even a pandemic. Every Christmas Jesus is born again in the heart of those whose hearts turn expectantly toward God. I pray God will bless each and every one of you with a heart open to receiving the miracles of Jesus' birth.

Diane Copp left us to be with our Lord November 24th. Please keep her two sons, her daughter, and their families in your prayers.



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#### **Blue Christmas**

Toward the end of the 20<sup>th</sup> century, Blue Christmas, or Longest Night, services began to be held for people in hospice care. The longest night of the year is December 21, and we are reminded that for a variety of reasons, even during the season of Advent, many people are experiencing the long night of grief, illness, death, or a variety of other situations that can put us in a dark place. "The Holidays" can be a very difficult time for people who are experiencing "a long night" in part because it seems everyone else is happy, laughing, celebrating, and overall exuding high and happy spirits. It is not a matter of people losing faith at a midnight

time in life; it is a matter of experiencing our faith differently and perhaps more deeply.

There is Hope even at midnight, but it comes not with the excitement of anticipation but more as a life preserver to hang onto, one that also hangs onto us. It is Hope based on past experience of difficult times that were survived because the Author of Hope saw us through and back out into the light of day.

There is Peace, but it is not the cozy peace of a fireside. Rather it is more the "Peace that passes all understanding." It is Peace in spite of the fear, pain, or sadness. It is Peace that lets us know that God will see to it that we make it, that nothing can separate us from God's Love. After all, God loves us so much that God came to earth.

We would all do well to stop our merry busy-ness and experience Advent and Christmas *with* someone who is experiencing a blue Christmas. Such sharing can enrich the meaning of Christ's birth for everyone involved.

I like the way Ann Weems talked about this way of observing Advent in her book *Kneeling in Bethlehem*. She wrote a poem titled "Yesterday's Pain."



Some of us walk into Advent tethered to our unresolved yesterdays the pain still stabbing the hurt still throbbing. It's not that we don't know better; it's just that we can't stand up anymore by ourselves. On the way to Bethlehem, will you give us a hand?

This year, find someone to whom you can "give a hand," someone you can help walk to Bethlehem. Rev. Dr. DeHoff
