June. Just the mention of that month when I was a kid kindled hope and anticipation of "School's Out!" And along with that came fond memories of past summers filled with fun. Trips, sometimes to the beach – always to visit grandparents; all sorts of projects with neighborhood friends; popsicles; and time to watch the clouds go by and dream.

Truth be told, I *still* look forward to sitting outside and watching the clouds while I dream of what the future – near and far – might hold. There are all sorts of possibilities, some with potential for becoming reality and some just magical wishes. But having the time, peace, and quiet to dream invariably lifts you above current circumstances and makes you aware of possibilities.

Not all the happy dreams come true, but some do. As the song from the movie "South Pacific" says, "you gotta have a dream. If you don't have a dream, how you gonna have a dream come true?" Watching the clouds and dreaming about the future gives opportunity to run across a dream that really could become a reality. Those dreams always take work; some take blood, sweat, and tears, but the actualization of the dream is a very satisfying and gratifying experience.

As you sit down or lie back and watch the clouds drift by, what dreams come to you? If you free you mind from all the tedium of daily living and ask yourself "what would be really nice right now?" what comes to mind? Another question to ask is "what change in my life would be energizing and renewing?" "What would I really like my life to look and feel like?"

This kind of dreaming can, in and of itself, be renewing and energizing. It is closely related to hope. Hope for the future springs from many sources, but certainly this kind of dreaming is one place from which it springs. "If you can dream it, you can make it happen" is a thought that applies to many cloud-watching dreams.

You are never too old or too young to dream these sorts of dreams. I once read that Kate Middleton dreamed as a little girl of becoming a princess. You are never too old to find a way to make a dream come true. A long time ago, I read the story of a man who, all his life, had wanted to be a preacher. At the age of 70 he was ordained to the ministry.

Cloud-dreaming is a pastime that is healthy and enjoyable at any age. In the Bible, dreaming is a way that God communicates with people. In the 21<sup>st</sup> century it is *still* a way God communicates with us. The bright dreams for the future that come while we are cloud watching may very well be given to us by God. And to the extent that is so, you can rest assured that God will supply all that is needed to make the dream become a reality.

So "put down knitting, the book, and the broom," as the song from *Cabaret* goes, and go find a puffy white cloud floating effortlessly in a blue sky. Follow its journey through its short life and dream. Dream about the way you'd like life to be. Dream about what you hope the future holds. Wait for a dream that you could make into a reality, and then go for it!

# Jime for Per Capita

Now that we have entered a new fiscal year, it is time to make your per capita contribution. *Per capita* is what the church sends to the Presbytery to help with presbytery expenses. It is called "per capita" because it is made up of \$55 per church member. UPCoW's per capita assessment for 2022 is \$5320, and it is due in full by December 31, 2022.

Presbytery uses the money that comes in from every church in the presbytery to pay staff, including the Stated Clerk and the Treasurer and to pay for other operating expenses. But it is also used to help church's in need of help for capital improvements and other needs. This past year Presbytery sent UPCoW a check to pay for the second half of Bob Stains' program at our church. That part of the program will teach some of our members how to lead dialogue groups, in the church's ongoing commitment to improving communication.

Last year church members were faithful in paying their part of this assessment. Thank you for doing the same this year!


