NOTES FROM THE PASTOR

SEPTEMBER 2022

Among the authors from whom I select reading material for beach devotions, Watchman Nee ranks near the top of the list. This year, before I left for Jekyll Island, I purchased Twelve Baskets Full, volume one. Someone, thankfully, took the trouble of preserving notes from Nee's many spoken presentations, and published them in three volumes. The title of this set comes from the feeding of the multitude, which generated 12 baskets full of leftover fragments. While I'm not sure calling these books "leftovers" from Nee's ministry (which sadly ended in a Chinese prison because he would not recant his Christian faith), I find this collection of messages, which could resemble a collection of sermons, to be a wonderful gift.

I don't know if it is true of all pastors, but it is true for this pastor that even on vacation, the church is never far from thoughts and prayers. I suppose that is why the devotions I read each morning often seem pertinent to "the church back home." Such was the case with the opening chapter, titled "The Flow of the Spirit." Here is the first paragraph:

There is a flow. Before God, we call it the "flow of the Spirit." In every age, God saw to it that this flow was not interrupted, that it was always progressing. The flow of the Spirit is progressing in the churches today. Some time ago I was reading a compilation of Wesley's messages. I thank God because I see that today the flow of the Spirit has moved onward. If today you should look back and examine Wesley, you would realize that their work before God was tremendously great and that perhaps our living cannot even match theirs. But today the flow of the Spirit is still moving on progressively. (1991, p. 7)

Looking back at the history of the Christian Church, even if we look back only as far as the Reformation, we can see that the flow of the Spirit has, indeed, moved forward steadily and undeterred over the course of the centuries. And it always moves forward, never backward.

It isn't a case of the message changing as society and culture change. And Nee does not imply that human beings are responsible for changes that produce forward momentum. Were we to understand the flow of the Spirit that way, we would paint a clear image of a tail wagging a dog.

God's way progresses through people through whom God can work. Part way through that first chapter, Nee poses a challenging, and perhaps disturbing, question: "Today, is God's way progressing out through us or through somebody else?" He answers that question saying, "This is what I call the authority of the Holy Spirit. If we have failed, the second step of the Holy Spirit is surely to get Himself out through somebody else" (pp. 11, 12). Each person who identifies as a child of God must prayerfully answer Nee's question with honesty that can come only through the inner working of the Holy Spirit.

In our time, little is said about discernment and its importance. Nee's question – and perhaps especially his answer – highlights the need for discernment for all of God's people. There are many things we need to discern in this life, but the one most important thing we must discern is whose voice we pay attention to: our own or the Spirit's. That is the toughest discernment to make, and yet not making it can derail the work of God and cause God to go call someone else to the task God had intended for us.

As we once again begin our forward movement into a new church year, let us resolve to pray less that God would grant what we ask and pray more that God would enable us to know the difference between our own inner voice and the inner voice of the Holy Spirit. We are moving forward, as that is the only direction God's church can move. But hearing our own voice telling us the path to take will land us where God would not have us go. Hearing God's voice, the church will follow the path God has already laid out.

The meeting ended with shared concerns and joys followed by a closing prayer from Gaye.



Sunday, June 26, 2023 was hot inside the church. The fans stirred the air, providing some relief to the congregation. First aid was administered and the local EMT's were called and the woman was taken to a local hospital.

Congregational Meeting
